Safety First

Here are some spring safety tips to keep yourself and your family safe as we head up to the cottage for the new season:

Removing any old paint cans and old newspapers. Our local dump in Christie will take hazardous materials, old furniture and appliances. Check for Spring hours of business.

Smoke alarms and carbon monoxide. Do you have enough in your cottage? We are required to have carbon monoxide detectors near all sleeping areas of our homes and in service rooms. Change the batteries each spring to be sure you are properly prepared for an emergency. Clean the dust covers!

Clean or replace your furnace filter.

Grease can accumulate on your stove hood. Properly cleaning this is one way to keep flames from spreading should a fire break out.

Fire extinguishers - Check all needle indicators and dates to be sure they are working.


Clean around your dryer (if you're lucky enough to have one at the cottage)! Check the dryer ducts for lint. Accumulation of lint can lead to a fire.

Practice ladder safety. If you plan on climbing a ladder, you should do so accompanied by someone who can help in the event of an emergency. Be sure ladders are placed on level spaces and they have been secured.

Check any gas-operated equipment to be sure all fuel lines are safe.

Campfires - Before starting a campfire be sure to check the fire rating. They are posted at the waste transfer sites or you can check online at:

Current Fire Hazard Rating: MODERATE

Low— No daytime burning is allowed unless authorized by Permit. Approved incinerators and camp fires are allowed.

Moderate— No daytime burning is allowed unless authorized by a Permit. Approved incinerators and camp fires are allowed.

High— NO OPEN BURNING, including incinerators. Burn Permits are SUSPENDED, campfires for cooking and warmth ONLY. NO fireworks!

Extreme—NO OPEN BURNING, campfires NOT allowed. NO fireworks permitted.

Fire Ban— TOTAL FIRE BAN—NO OPEN BURNING, NO FIRE-WORKS.

Gypsy Moths

Experts say to prepare for another LDD moth infestation this spring.

Severe LDD moth infestations are cyclical, occurring every seven to 10 years, and usually last three to five years. Star Lake was fortunate enough to have had minimal damage to our forests compared to other areas of cottage country.

The egg masses hatch in the spring and larvae emerge. The moth larvae consume leaves, defoliating trees, and in some cases, trees are left incapable of reproducing leaves.

If you've spotted the egg masses, experts say to wear gloves and scrape the mass into a bucket of soapy water. If you see the catepillars, they recommend wrapping burlap around the trunk of your tree to keep them at bay and remove them the same way as the egg masses.


Keep on the lookout for them!


